SYNOPSIS - 'Noises Off' takes place in the 80's, and is a play about terrible actors putting on an awful play called **'Nothing On'**, which is set in the mid-1960s. This simpler time allows for shenanigans and miscommunications that our connected modern world simply will not allow, a time where calling someone meant having some change for the payphone. **'Nothing On'** is written to be a *bad play as part of the farce*, and any insensitivities (sexual, racial, or otherwise) are a part of that show, and integral to the overall plot, and are not reflected by ACT (a community theatre) or the company.


Director's Notes- The process of taking a play from the script to the stage is often odd and complex, and is different with every theatre group. This particular show has gone from dream to reality, from reality to impossibility, from impossibility to possibility, and back around again to reality over 5 years, a story almost as interesting as the show you are about to watch.

Noises Off is a farce filled with innuendo and biting wit, and has been a favorite of mine since I first read it. For years, I heard the show spoken of time and again by other actors and directors... how it was their dream role, or script, and how much they wished that someone else would just direct it already. It became clear that if I wanted to see this show on stage, I would have to direct it myself.

When ACT began planning our 25th anniversary, I put together a team and proposed remounting Noises Off, which had been ACT's 4th show (1996). Rehearsals began in January 2020. In March, a few weeks before going on stage, the show was cancelled as the world went into lockdown. It took three years, but we are back, with a mix of new and returning actors.

Please sit back, turn off your worries (and your cell phone) and enjoy the show: it was brought to you by hours of hard work not only by the actors you see on stage, but also by the crew, actors and crew from the prior run that never was, the production team, costumer, set designer, the list goes on. Thank you for supporting community theatre, and allowing us to bring our dreams to life under the lights. Being in front of you has been our end goal from the beginning, and we hope to entertain you tonight.







MARTI HOPSON grew up on the shores of Lake Superior, and completed a Bachelor of Fine Arts at Concordia University and then a Masters of Music at the University of Victoria. She composed, performed, directed, and stage managed many musical and theatre events in Ontario, Quebec and BC before becoming a veterinarian and taking a lengthy hiatus from the world of the arts. Acting is a new pursuit, but after moving to PEI, she found herself on stage for 'Sinners', 'The Shop Around the

Corner', 'Skin Flick' and 'Wake in the West' as well as directing / producing several shows. Since 2015 she has been spinning plates of sardines continuously with the North Shore Players, ACT, the Gulf Shore Drama Club and the River Clyde Pageant and her children just hope she doesn't drop any.



Originally from Fredericton, New Brunswick, **MIKE MALLALEY** moved to Charlottetown in 2016. Since coming to the Island Mike played Vadas in 'Shop Around the Corner' (ACT, 2017) and appeared in 'Raised on Television' 2 & 3. Mike has been acting since the ripe old age of 6, with his first role being a chorus member of 'The Ugly Duckling'. He has since moved onto over 50 roles on stage, including Brad in 'The Rocky Horror Picture Show', Lurch in 'The

Addams Family Musical', Lawrence in 'Calendar Girls', and Antigonus in 'The Winter's Tale'. Mike has had over 10 roles in film and television and has been nominated twice for Best Actor in a short comedy at The Silver Wave Film Festival, winning once for 'Super Geek Mathboy'.







He's also the MC of

Charlottetown Burlesque, so it's entirely possible you've seen him take his clothes off before. He lives in Stratford with his wife, two small children, and a growing collection of hats.



LAURA STAPLETON'S love of theatre began at a young age in Cape Breton where she was born and raised. After being cast as Little Red Riding Hood at the age of 6 in a children's theatre group the acting bug took hold.
